

Dear Members,

Thank you so much for your patience as the Board of RHYC worked with the Roche Harbor Marina (RHM) to clarify our outstation situation. As some of you may know, RHM upgraded many of their permanent moorage slips to accommodate changes mandated by the National Electric Code. In doing so they had to update our slip as well. As such they began to experience problems when members whose boats were not up to electrical code, began to cause the breakers to flip when they would put their boat on shore power. Our members come in and out of the slip at all hours and this was causing quite a fuss for nearby boats as well as damaging the breaker locally at the slip. So RHM had to make a decision to stop allowing our boats to be in that slip and began to move us elsewhere. This happened very quickly and it was only at the Colors Cruise earlier this month, when board members were able to sit down and discuss this with Kevin who is the harbormaster and Troy who works for him. Details of the meeting will be written up in minutes and on the RHYC website at a later date. However here is how the outstation will work from now on.

Starting immediately: RHM is going to provide 2 slips, daily, during the cruising season and into the winter months (which we don't typically need) as well as 1 overflow spot. RHM will also maintain a waitlist, of one boat at a time, just like our book system worked. The marina will only charge us for usage. Because this will be a slip situation, rather than just dock space, the potential exists for more boats to be accommodated. For example, given that no one is in an outstation slip and boat size is no longer a consideration, if a boat comes into the marina, then they will get a slip. If a second boat comes in they will also get a slip. Then if a 3<sup>rd</sup> boat comes in, they will go into overflow, if marina space is available. If you can move from overflow to a regular outstation slip then you will be granted one more night. One consecutive night in overflow or a total of 2 nights of outstation use within 14 consecutive days is still the limit. This is the same as before. RHM will monitor all of this and report back to us in September. From now until September they will only charge us our usual monthly slip rate. When the board meets with them in September, we will evaluate the usage and determine how this works for us financially. However, the board's initial evaluation indicates that this will result in an increased benefit to the club and our members.

IMPORTANT CHANGES: In order to be put into the "outstation" slip, you MUST:

- Call into 78A when you get into the harbor—this means you need to be physically present in the harbor AND you have to hail during office hours. State that you are requesting an RHYC outstation slip if one is available. In other words, do not come into the marina at midnight and expect to have someone to answer your call- they won't be there to do so
- Present you CURRENT RHYC membership card to the MOORAGE COLLECTION PERSON when again, stating that you are taking an RHYC outstation slip, to verify

that you are a member. Just the burgee won't cut it! If you CANNOT present your card to verify that you are an active member, then be ready to pay for the slip outright. RHYC will NOT reimburse you for this. If you have lost your card send an email to <u>secretary@rhyc.org</u> to request a replacement. This will not be handled on an emergency basis. Remember that, daily, the marina is holding 2 slips for RHYC members, with the possibility of a 3<sup>rd</sup> for an overflow if space permits. If you can't verify your membership when you come in, then those 3 slips will wait for other members.

Thank you all for your patience. RHM has worked with us and answered all of the questions that you sent to me. IF you have further questions or concerns then please email me directly.
